- Appline: What are your goals as an Election Commissioner and why do you want to become an election commissioner?
 - I love ethics and rules, I want to make sure that things are being followed.
- Correa-Ferro: How do violations work in the election process?
 - There are 4 strike systems. Every violation is different. Examples like passing out food or social media use.
- O’Blenis: How will you engage graduate students into elections when historical graduate students do not partake in student government elections?
 - Working with graduate studies and trying to email them about what is going on, invite them to the forums and such.
- Besirevic: If you were to not be apart of the Election Commission, would you, personally, now be honest, push for election involvement from fellow Knights, again with a personal interest, and if so, how?
 - Prevent students from being bombarded by all the campaigning going on. If people vote here, they will be likely to vote in real life.
- Moscol: How has PLC prepare you for this position?
 - Put in a lot of uncomfortable positions. Learned how to stand up and speak up. I am very prone to calling things out and I learned how to do that the professional way.
- Moscol: I’m glad about your ambition towards Downtown Campus. What is your favorite initiative?
 - Working with the RAs. If we go there and let students know about what is going on will make them feel like they are a part of what is going on.
- Appline: How do you plan on managing your time in EC while being so involved?
 - I have pretty free days thursday and friday. After 4 I don’t work so I have free evenings.
- Liliana Ramos - Election Commission Seat 2; Passed 6-0-0
 - Correa-Ferro: What are your statutory requirements to be a Commissioner?
 - Be unbiased, have the ten hours during the declaration of candidacy after that and so on.
 - Moscol: How has your high school voting experience helped you for this position?
 - It was a double edged sword, I learned about educating people on the upcoming primaries, and in this position, it would be a larger scale in regards to teaching people about voting.
 - O’Blenis: How will you engage graduate students into elections when historical graduate students do not partake in student government elections
 - One way we can do that is through cognitive dissonance. Educate them, make them understand that it is going to affect them even though they are leaving early.
 - Besirevic: Can you please give me an instance where you were unbiased?
 - I had friends in student government but i always maintained professionalism. I never gave anyone a prize nor campaigned for them.
 - Foster: You mentioned that you would like to change voting turnout, do you have any ideas of how you would like to do that on our campus?
 - What I did there was a lot smaller than what I will be doing here. Showing people that what we do here is important and the decisions we make affect them
- Sheina Koolik - Election Commission Seat 4; Passed 9-0-0
 - Correa-Ferro: What are your statutory requirements to be a Commissioner?
 - 10 hours before the declaration of candidacy, 10 hours when it happening, be unbiased, etc.
 - Moscol: What do you plan on bringing from your experience in high school elections to this position?
 - I only worked on the 2016 presidential elections. I worked in a very homogeneous area that included a lot of old people who would yell at me. I definitely learn how to keep my cool, how to smile and nod, and how to compose myself.
 - Besirevic: How do you plan to step out of your personal comfort zone to grow in benefit of the Election Commission?
 - I really want to reach out to more people and making feel like everyone feels like they are being heard.
 - O’Blenis: How will you engage graduate students to partake in senate and presidential elections when historically graduate students do not partake?
 - In terms of reaching out to them and getting them more involved, I feel the same way about any other kinds of voters. Trying to find a different medium that might appeal to them. Showing up and talking to people is the best way to me.
 - Appline: How do you plan on managing your time as a participant in the Miss UCF Scholarship Pageant and being on EC

- I am really good at time management, I thrive at keeping busy, I love to make lists. I have three different calendars. I am very involved but I have spent a lot of time working on time management and I know how to prioritise what needs to be done.
 - Lopez: How will your experience as an intern at the Office of the United States House Representative Ted Deutch help you as a commissioner on EC?
 - I focused on dealing with constituents, I wrote emails to be sent out to them and made them little packets. It was a great skill builder, I learned how to keep myself and other things organized.
 - Giorgi: Which do you prefer: quantity or quality?
 - I prefer quality over quantity. I give all of myself to everything that I do. I am gonna look forward to making sure that the voters are informed.
- Victoria Chin - Election Commission Seat 5; Passed 5-0-2
 - O'Blenis: How will you engage graduate students into elections when historical graduate students do not partake in student government elections?
 - I would speak to some of the grad students that we have in SGA and ask them how their college promotes stuff and from there I would use these procedures and make sure that the grad students know about what is going on.
 - Foster: As a freshman, how will you balance your new life in college with the responsibilities of an election commissioner?
 - I have a planner, I have my stuff worked out. I have planned the differ
 - Moscol: What previous experience has prepared you for this position?
 - I was a part of my high school student government for three years and I helped promote the elections, I also saw how things were run last semester.
 - Besirevic: Will you push yourself to step out of your comfort zone to increase involvement with elections, and how so?
 - Yes, I will. I will talk more around the housing and campuses and be at the tents and try to get people more involved
 - Appline: Why did you want to become an election commissioner?
 - I wanted to be a part of SGA while not being a part of it, I wanted to make a change and difference within UCF.
 - Appline: What changes did you want to make within UCF?
 - For students to know what is EC and how we help SGA, what their vote means
- Alex Rutledge - Election Commission Seat 7; Passed 7-0-0
 - Appline: What are your goals as an Election Commissioner
 - Increase voter turnout and quality. UCF elections are not always ideal. There is definitely a dominance in the demographics of voters. I intend on expanding that so that everyone can have a voice. Increase the quality of voters by having pamphlets and also including candidates' platforms on the SGA website. Violation information. I want to make sure that they know which violations are most common so that they can avoid falling into them. And also keeping a detailed record for the commission. Work on having a unified database for the commission.
 - Appline: Why did you want to become an election commissioner
 - EC is the backbone of UCF SGA as a whole. It is completely independent from a branch and it works to make sure that everyone has a voice. I am already familiar with title 6 just by reading it for E&A.
 - Correa-Ferro: Since EC usually has the most turnover and leadership changes. What will you do as an Election Commissioner to help retain others for the future?
 - One thing that I have communicated to Emma is making sure that all commissioners have as much information as they need about the process. So that if there's a need for a change in leadership, they would be ready to step up.
 - St Preux: Describe one instance in your life where you have been unbiased and how do you plan on maintaining unbiasedness in your daily role as a commissioner?
 - Back in high school when I was in SGA, running elections for the next election was a process that required unbiasedness because those running were my friends and such. Not showing any biases towards them, treating them like I treat everyone else.
 - O'Blenis: How will you engage Downtown students into Senate and Presidential elections other than social media?
 - One of the ways that EC is set up, there are three places where we can set up to promote elections.. In order to include the DT campus, we would expand the opportunities that are given to the main campus students will be given to the DT students as well to ensure that students from both campuses get access to equal information.

- Besirevic: It is known that being apart of social Greek Life (non-academic fraternities and sororities) is a major factor in increasing possibility of gaining votes and I want to know how would you get those freshmen specifically, (being that they are new to UCF) that are not apart of social Greek Life, involved to learn about elections and vote?
 - Discussed during budget hearings, the work that is put on the EC's end will not always correlate to voter turnout. As a commission, we need to find the need and desire in the students to vote. Unless students see a need to have their voices, the voting turnouts won't change. We are going to have voter merchandise, etc., but that won't change from the side of EC alone.
- O'Brien: How will you engage graduate students into elections when historical graduate students do not partake in student government elections
 - For graduate students, in order to appeal to them, we have to make sure that the effects of the presidential elections till matter to them and still affect their lives on campus. When we do that, they will be more inclined to take approaches to be more involved in that process.
- St Preux: If someone could write a book about your life, what would the title be and why?
 - "Just Go with It" because I am pretty laid back person, but when it comes to a business setting, I am a pretty detailed person and I like to make sure that things are done the way they need to be done. I understand the difference between just hanging out with friends and being in a casual setting, but when it comes to business, it involves seriousness and responsibility and I understand that.
- Serenity Anderson - Election Commission Seat 8; Passed 6-0-0
 - Correa-Ferro: What are your statutory requirements to be a Commissioner?
 - Unbiased, work 10 hours per week during elections, week after, and during another week. Keep an eye on where people are distributing campaign materials.
 - Correa-Ferro: How will you manage and dedicate your time to the Election Commission with all your other positions?
 - I can make my own hours at my job luckily. They know I want to be involved on campus too. My sorority position is also very flexible. My classes are also mostly online, and I practice time management a lot.
 - O'Brien: How will you engage graduate students into elections when historical graduate students do not partake in student government elections?
 - Even though it's difficult because they may not feel as involved, I think that showing them how much it affects them as well. Providing a perspective of importance and influence will help with this.
