- ii. The Geneva Convention of 1929 is signed by 53 member nations, which defines who is considered a lawful combatant and, thus, a prisoner of war. The treaty also specified that all POWs are considered prisoners of the state that captured them, and thus would be subjected to stately protections, rather than individual soldiers; moreover, certain civilians and women captured as POWs are to be treated with respect and humanity.
 - iii. In 1921, insulin was proven to be a blood sugar regulator by a team of researchers, led by Canadian Frederick Banting, paving the way for its development as a medicinal agent to treat diabetes. Fun fact: the patent for insulin as a medical instrument was sold for only \$1, the intent being that the original researchers wanted it to be a tool for healing, not for profit.

 - i. The [Student Priorities Survey 2022-2023](#) currently has **98** responses!
 - 1. As was discussed prior to the meeting, this survey benefits everyone in SG, not just GAP/SBA. This is extremely important to distribute. There's a lot of benefit to be had, so seeing this volume is very uplifting. Matters of civil rights, economic issues (worker's rights. etc), it is a good gauge for where students lie.
 - ii. GAP will be working with Senators that have political/advocacy-oriented RSOs underneath them to get the survey sent out over the next week or so.
 - 1. Reason for this focus is because apolitical RSOs are not as active as politically active ones in the summer. Once the fall convenes, cultural

RSOs can be more the priority in order to get a greater volume of responses going forward.

- iii. We will prioritize political/advocacy-oriented RSOs first but the goal will be to have all Senators sending out this survey to their respective RSOs by the second week of the Fall semester.
 1. We do have more flexibility since this year's session is in March, not in January (a luxury the prior GAP Committee unfortunately did not have).
- b. IgKnight Your Vote 2022 Voter Guides
 - i. Voter Guides will be an important component of the IgKnight Your Vote Campaign.
 1. While EC is taking point on this, the aim is to have all other organs of SG to be involved equally in order to make this more of a collaborative effort. Having GAP take on a direct role is a major priority.
 2. Our actions will be focused on creating a Voter's Guide *for the general midterm elections in November*. Primary Season is getting very close, and not as much interest vs. the actual midterm. Using the Guide to discuss ballot initiatives in Orange, Seminole Counties will be helpful.
 - ii. What races and initiatives do we want to make guides for? Do we want to make guides for other races happening around the state? Do we want to make guides for races happening in other parts of the country?
 1. Discussion:
 - a. Temple: Start at the legislative level, with state and national candidates being a priority. Include links to platforms, social media as well as a fundamental overview of what they are running on, where they are running, etc.
 - b. Damarla: Concur; focus on Florida.
 - c. Simko: Put some emphasis on the ballot measures. Researched some initiatives, there are three initiatives that are rather vague, so informing students can help them understand them. It would be interesting to provide information on initiatives on areas outside Orange County (ie

- Hillsborough, South Florida, etc). Provide information on those areas' races.
- d. Caldwell: Including basically campaign finance information can be of use to detail where they are getting their funds. We should include scandals in order to get a fuller picture of candidates. Using OpenSecrets for campaign finance can help
 - e. Kostis: Echoes Caldwell; putting information about how they get their funding (corporate vs. grassroots) is important. I don't think we should focus on races outside Orange County. Some elections within the state can be of help.
 - f. Yalamanchili (Non-Committee Member): Wanted to echo the sentiments of Caldwell, Kostis; guides should be transparent to discuss the good and bad of the candidates. We should refrain from making judgements based on these candidates from their actions.
 - g. Hall: I love the idea of campaign finance disclosure so it is very helpful, providing a better sense of the candidate's interests. When it comes to scandals, I am supportive of the matter, but we would need to discuss with Governmental Affairs in Admin to navigate. However, it would be important to disclose such actions. To discuss the bulk of the Guide, I am envisioning it being focused on Orange, Seminole and partially Osceola. What could be done is that we could focus on larger races (ie federal races). We will definitely focus on statewide races (AG, Agriculture Commissioner, Governor, etc). Different ballot initiatives at the county, state levels are also priority. A ballot initiative almost turned Florida into a jungle primary which would've been bad. So making sure these initiatives are clearly defined will benefit especially younger voters. Races outside Florida would be a good idea, but it would not be a good use of time. We could link websites, news outlets to discuss matters outside Florida. We could even start working on these first Wednesday back.
