 1. General Information
 - a. [Fiscal Bill 56-28](#)
 - b. Senate Contribution: \$8,817.63
 - c. RSO Actual Contribution: \$2076.50 (23.5%)
 - d. Statutes recommend a 60% sanction
 2. Speech
 - a. Daniel Dominguez (RSO rep): Don't have access to the funds directly, that is through the liaison, Christopher Lonas.
 - b. Christopher Lonas (Liaison/Advisor): When we were building the proposals and submitting the invoices that came directly from the central chapter. The flights came in below expected. We understand that this is an issue. Daniel and the other students don't have much control over this.
 3. Questioning
 - a. Rose: Christopher, are you part of the central chapter?
 - i. Christopher: No, I support the student chapter as an alumni volunteer.
 - b. Rose: Have you had contact with the central chapter?
 - i. Christopher: Yes. As they actualized everything, the flights were cheaper. Every year, the competition averages out to \$15,000.
 4. Debate
 - a. Rose: Generally, we decide sanctions starting from the statute recommended amount and reducing based on the circumstances. The recommended sanction itself can be reduced a bit if you reimburse the business office. If you paid back the business office to reach 50% contribution, it would go to 30% plus an additional 15% for reverting >20% of

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senate funds, for a total of a 45% recommended sanction. This would mean reimbursing the business office for \$2332.32. If you paid back the business office to reach 95% contribution, it would go to 30% for reverting >50% of senate funds. This would mean reimbursing the business office \$6301.25.

- i. Christopher: will they receive a sanction either way?
 1. Rose: Up to the committee
 - b. Greene: question to the committee- do we wait for information from the main chapter?
 - i. Varela: Wait for reimbursements if they are going through with that
 - c. Rose (to Christopher): Would you be interested in reimbursing?
 - i. Christopher: I would do whatever is needed to make sure the students are not punished. If a \$6,000 reimbursement check is needed, I would write that.
 - d. Rose: You should also take into account how much you expect to request in the upcoming fiscal year to determine if it is cheaper to reimburse or just take the sanction. If I were to say a broad range, probably between 30% to 50% sanction in this case would be appropriate.
 - e. Varela: \$6000 short of expected contribution is a lot, though I understand that the students don't have much control in this situation. Would lean towards the 40s for a sanction.
 - f. Scott: ~40 percent would be appropriate
 - g. Rose: are you expected to request again for this trip?
 - i. Christopher: Yes. Expected to be 13k – 15k normally.
 - ii. Rose: in that case it would be cheaper to receive a 40% sanction than to reimburse.
 - h. Greene: To reiterate, the estimates for registration were not final on third reading in Senate?
 - i. Rose: I thought it was flights?
 - i. Christopher: Flights, lodging, and registration could have varied.
 - j. Varela: I'm going to motion for 40% sanction

 - i. Caringal: Yes, this has happened before. We don't have much control over it.

 - i. Caringal: Yes, but they might not have been aware of the penalties (sanctions). Probably won't happen again taking that into account. Also, I am leaving a massive transition binder.
